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Post Traumatic Stress (PTS) is a major problem for our men and women in uniform, and its effects last far and beyond the battlefield. One in five veterans returning from combat tours suffers from PTS. Many of them are so debilitated that they are unable to leave their homes or engage in any meaningful way in society. With the combination of therapy, medications and the companionship of a service dog who does not judge them but does inspire and require them to get up and out, we are seeing our veterans experience a new lease on life with a boost in their confidence, increased productivity, and improved relationships through the sense of security and companionship that their service dog provides.

"Shelter to Soldier's gradual and comprehensive training approach has re-familiarized me with the innate goodness of my soul. For far too long, I had become focused on my pain, anxiety and anger. I no longer knew how to get out of the PTSD cyclone and was taking my family on a downward spiral."

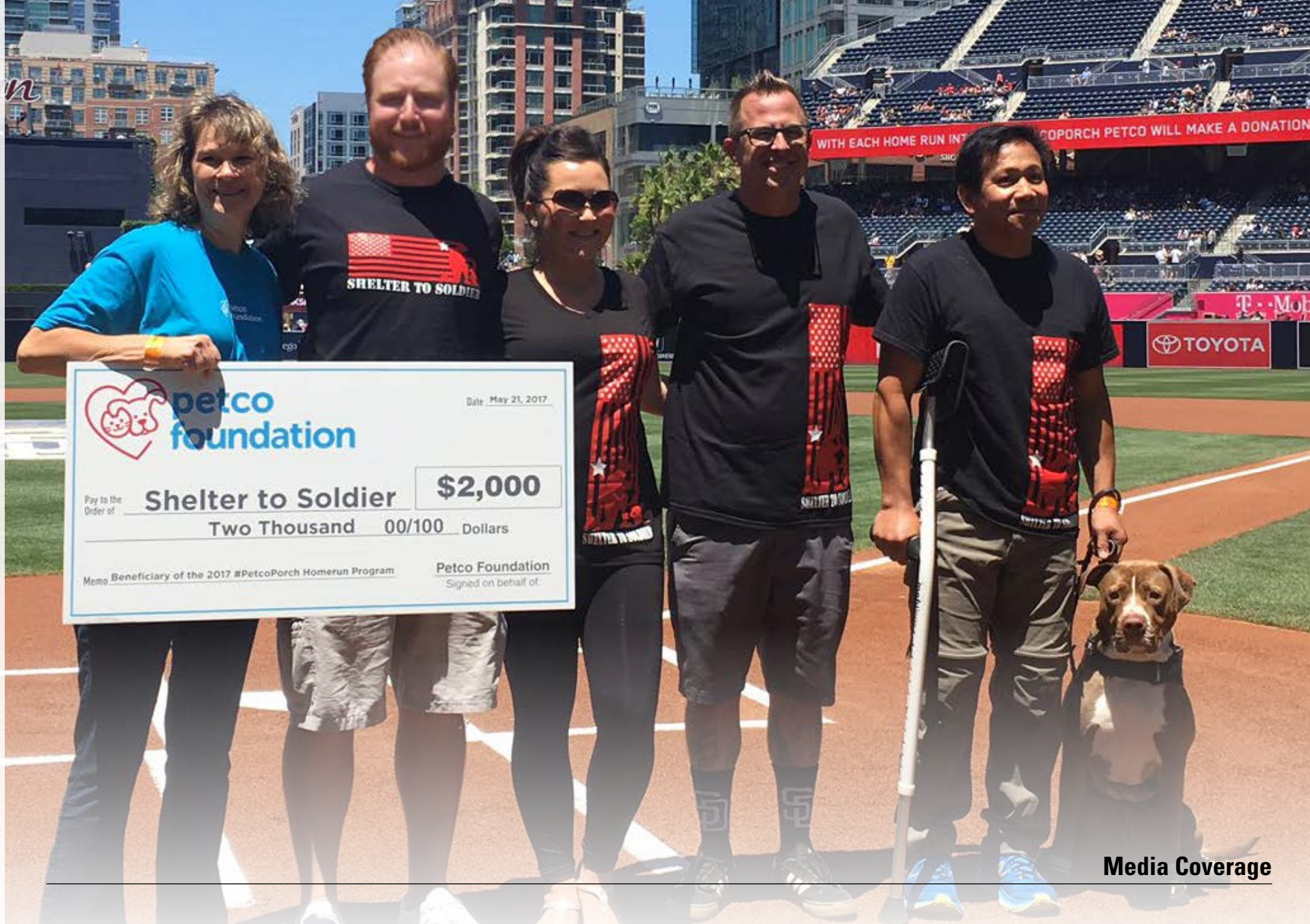
SHELTER TO SOLDIER **A 501c3 Nonprofit Organization**

\$12,000

Each service dog/veteran team costs our program \$12,000 from adoption to graduation. This includes the adoption, housing, medical care, grooming, food, treats, training, training equipment, bedding, toys, testing, handling training, service dog equipment and documents, graduation and materials for the veteran recipient and service dog pair.

Shelter to Soldier visits local shelters and rescue groups and evaluates dogs 4 months to 2 years of age, of any breed, weighing 45-70 lbs, and in good health for our service dog training program.

We evaluate temperament for: desire to work and have a job, food or moderate toy drive, the way the dog handles new environments, people and noises, and an overall stable and social demeanor.



Three tests are required prior to completion of training:

- Canine Good Citizen
- ADI Public Access Test
- Task-Related Test



Shelter to Soldier dogs are trained over 9-18 months to be highly obedient and handler-focused in all environments, to ignore distractions, and to mitigate symptoms of stress, anxiety, and depression through task-related work.

GRADUATION! We celebrate the dedication of the dog and handler once they successfully complete all necessary training and pass required tests.

This is where the journey truly begins for the veteran/service dog team!



Upon qualified match – **veteran handlers train for 3-5 months** time depending upon handling abilities and how well the team picks up on training.

Handlers learn to communicate effectively with their dog to create a loving bond while learning all commands and service dog laws/regulations to prepare them for a life with a service animal.

In Fall 2016, Shelter to Soldier service dog recipient Vic Martin proposed a volunteer role so that he could get more involved in serving veterans who are battling the same issues with which he was so familiar. Very quickly,

Vic began accepting all incoming veteran applications, explaining our application process to them in full detail, and guiding them along their application journey including working with health care providers to obtain their letter of recommendation for a service dog and proof of combat-related diagnoses. He also volunteered his time to connect with our veteran graduates and veterans in handler training to get them together for fun meet-ups with their service dogs, worked with our training team to help those graduates in need of follow up training schedule time at our facility, and sent very valuable information regarding veteran services and events within the community to our veteran team on a regular basis.

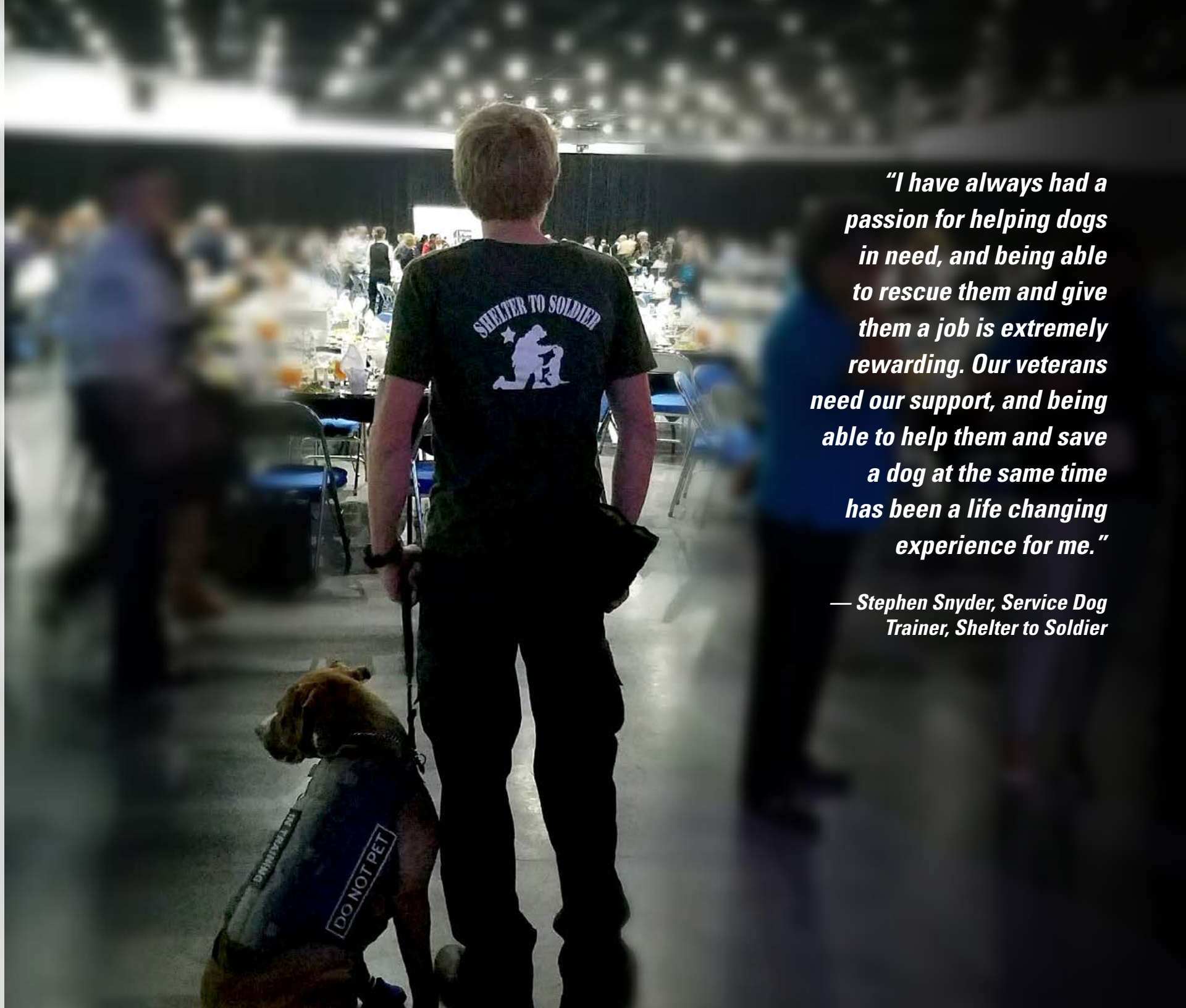

JULIO 1 YEAR OLD

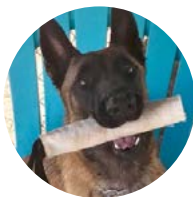

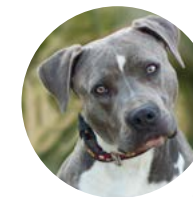
JAX 1 YEAR OLD

Mr. Casiple completed 21 years in the United States Army, 13+ years of his service as a Green Beret. He began in Special Forces as an Engineer and Demolitions Sergeant and as a Linguist. In 2006, he was advanced to the position of Special Forces Operations Sergeant. Leo was medically retired in September 2011.

After the 9/11 attacks, Leo deployed on overseas assignments as an advisor for allied nations where he helped countries protect its citizens from aggressors; recovered hostages; captured designated enemies of the United States; and responded to terrorist activities abroad. The physical toll resulted in a C3-C4 cervical disc replacement, hip resection surgery, 3 knee surgeries, 3 heat strokes, and neuropathic nerve pain from multiple bulging spinal discs. During the medical retirement process, Leo declined a PTSD diagnosis from the Army; however, less than two years after medical retirement, he faced multiple costly legal battles and was even hospitalized at an

inpatient facility as a direct result of PTSD-induced intense rage and impulsiveness. Without an outlet for the mindset that had become habituated to chaos, crises, and adrenaline, Leo became a person without a purpose, turned his energy toward hating himself, and became a villain to his family and the community.

During their first meeting, Leo sensed Moose's quiet confidence and was impressed by Moose's intuition to try to heal Leo's injured hip. Leo immediately appreciated Moose's subtle but solid personality, elements that Leo lost when he became a disabled veteran. During their first casual walk, (Leo hobbled on crutches, Moose walked) Leo was touched when Moose refused to continue walking uphill until after Leo's breathing returned to normal. It felt like a team event. Leo sees Moose as his fourth son, as his brother on an A-Team, as one of his best friends, and as a daily reminder of the goodness within Leo's heart.

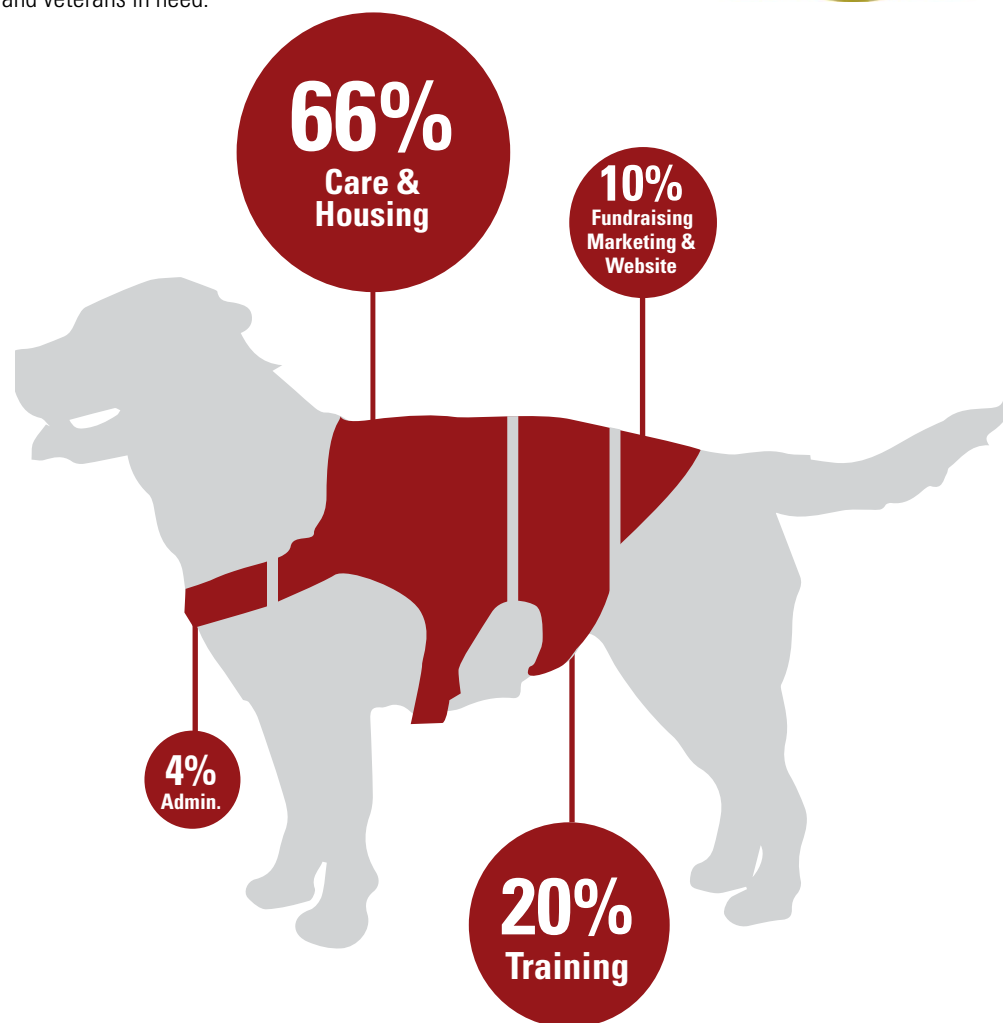
